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All about Mexico City's coolest areas

Colonia Juárez

Located within the Cuauhtémoc neighbourhood, Colonia Juárez (opposite) was once one of the city's most affluent areas up until the 1900s, when it fell into disrepair. It was revived by artists and intellectuals in the 1960s, and today is home to many bars, restaurants, and **Soho House Mexico City**.

Centro Histórico

The beating heart of Mexico City features more than 1,500 historical buildings, including the ancient Aztec temple, Templo Mayor, the Palacio Nacional with its Diego Rivera murals, and the Zócalo, Latin America's largest square.

Colonia Roma

Alfonso Cuarón's 2018 Oscar®-winning film, Roma, cemented the district's reputation as a hotspot for art galleries, small museums, stylish bars and restaurants in French colonial buildings, plus squares such as the Plaza Rio de Janeiro (opposite).

Coyoacán

With its cobbled streets, colourful piazzas and quiet feel, Frida Kahlo and her husband Diego Rivera chose to live in this former rural village for many years. The pilgrimage to La Casa Azul (the Blue House), Kahlo's original home, is a must.

The art you'll find around Soho House Mexico City

The art in our first Latin American House is a celebration of the wide-reaching talent of Mexico City, with a focus on artists born. based or trained here. Soho House's Global Director of Art. Kate Brvan, and her team worked with established and up-and-coming art galleries in Mexico City, such as OMR and kurimanzutto, alongside the art fairs ZONAMACO. Salón ACMF and Material to curate a collection of 150 pieces in a variety of media. It includes pottery, photography, works on paper, paintings, and textiles.

In some areas of the building, the ceilings reach up to three metres in height, offering ample space to display the collection. This, combined with the thriving artistic talent in the capital, has helped to make the collection at **Soho House Mexico City** one of the most exciting of all our global locations.

Site-specific commissions include a floor-to-ceiling textile piece, which wraps around all four walls of the reception area, by Gabriel Rosas Alemán and Mariá Fernanda Camarena. who form the art duo. Celeste. In the main bar of the House is a commissioned woven tapestry by Dr Lakra (opposite). Born in Mexico City, his work speaks to Mexican folklore. iconography and tattoo culture There will also be a hanging sculpture for the Pool House made from cowhide and steel by Yeni Mao, while Sofía Táboas is creating a glass installation - the first of its kind for Soho House

1 Lago/ Algo

This cultural centre (opposite) is located inside Mexico's largest park, Bosque de Chapultepec. The contemporary art on display is of the highest level, curated by Jérôme Sans, founder and former director of the Palais de Tokyo in Paris. **lago-algo.mx**

2 Nordenhake

With galleries in Stockholm and Berlin, Nordenhake focuses on international contemporary art. Frida Escobedo redesigned the site in Mexico City, so if you want to have an aesthetic experience while you're here, this is the place.

3 Galería Agustina Ferreyra

At the heart of Mexico City's independent art scene, this gallery spearheads emerging Latin American artists, with a roster including Ramiro Chaves, Geles Cabrera, Paloma Contreras Lomas, and Dalton Gata. Plus, its new location in Roma Norte is always a pleasure to visit. agustinaferreyra.com

4 Material Art Fair

Material Art Fair is a breath of fresh air during the hectic February Art Week in Mexico City. Now in its 10th year, Material is an established cultural node in contemporary art. Discover publications, performances, and a robust public programme – and don't miss its opening parties. material-fair.com

5 Mercado La Lagunilla In this sprawling indoor market that takes place every Sunday, you will find Mexican modern art, antique furniture and vintage fashion. Grab a Michelada to drink while you browse the stalls.





Eat and drink your way around Soho House Mexico City

FOOD & DRINK

Headed up by chef Andrea Cavaliere, the food and drink offering at **Soho House Mexico City** (opposite) is a blend of internationally recognised House favourites with local specialities and flavours.

The breakfast menu features well-loved classics, such as granola, Eggs Benedict and a range of tropical fruits for which Mexico is famous, alongside a selection of *concha* and *oreja* pastries from the local Panaderia Rosetta bakery. Later in the day, in addition to the Dirty Burger and Greek Salad from our international House menu, you can tuck into Slow-Cooked Short Rib, Grilled Baja Lobster and Mexican Chocolate Tart while lounging by the 62 ft pool, along with a beet and coconut cocktail. On Sunday, indulge in the Seafood Paella, which celebrates local ingredients and flavours of the region.

All of the food at the House is prepared in an open kitchen, so that guests can see their dishes being made, creating a lively dining experience. A buzzing tequila and mezcal bar serves local varieties of the famous Mexican spirits, and is one of the many locations dotted throughout the House where members and guests can eat and drink.

1 Máximo Bistrot

Located in Roma Norte, Máximo Bistrot (opposite) is my favourite place in Mexico. My trick is to ask the chef to pick five dishes – I've never been disappointed. maximobistrot.com.mx

2 Danubio

This classic dining spot in the city specialises in seafood. Order the Langostinos and a bottle of wine, or simply enjoy a Suero or Clamato Preparado. danubio.com

3 Cantina del Bosque

Another true classic, make sure you try the Pescado a la Sal, Milanesa, and Tacos de Lengua. After eating, enjoy some drinks while playing dominoes in the games room. **@cantinaelbosque**

4 Fonda Margarita

For an authentic Mexican breakfast, get here early to avoid waiting for a table. Must-haves include: Huevos Tirados, Chicharrón en Salsa Verde and Bistec en Pasilla. This restaurant truly represents us as Mexicans. @fondamargarita

5 Bósforo Mezcaleria

This mezcal bar has been here forever. A level above other similar spots in the city, you can sample all kinds of mezcal from different regions. @bosforomezcaleria

1 Sandra Weil

The flagship store in Mexico City offers contemporary clothes inspired by nature, with sustainability at its core. After collaborating with architect Pablo Pérez Palacios, it's now a cultural hub dedicated to empowering women through timeless fashion. sandraweil.com

2 Tiempos

This futuristic space in Colonia Juárez houses the store, offices and creative studios of Tiempos, a cutting-edge fashion label founded by Esteban Tamayo. From the architecture – designed alongside Sala Hars – to the furniture, it creates an experience that goes beyond shopping. tiempos.shop

3 Pinguino

I adore Pinguino (opposite) - a colourful space bursting with unique items. From quirky gifts to creative stationery and accessories, every piece has been carefully sourced from artisans in Mexico. A must-visit for offbeat souvenirs. pinguinomexico.com

4 La Murciélaga

The perfect place for book lovers to find very rare first editions and publications in a wide range of languages, while savouring the quiet joy of being surrounded by stories. A literary paradise. @lamurcielaga

5 Revancha

This record store is a vinyl sanctuary with an emphasis on indie and alternative releases. The welcoming atmosphere makes Revancha a hub for music fans seeking both new discoveries and old classics. **revanchadf.com**

Own the night at Soho House Mexico City

A rolling programme of events and parties tailored to the atmosphere and location of **Soho House Mexico City** (opposite) helps to build our creative community, allowing members to relax and connect

Previous highlights include a tequila tasting with master distiller Sergio Cruz, where members enjoyed small-batch tequila paired with cocktails and bites. They also learnt more about the spirit, such as the difference between additive-free and mass-produced brands.

Another memorable event was Playdate Drag hosted by Señorita Carlangas, in which the famous board game, Lotería, was played with a unique twist. Combining drag performance and comedy, members brought their friends along for an evening of laughter and games.

Formerly the wine cellar, the basement of the House has been transformed into several lounge spaces, complete with a vinyl bar. The existing cellar was both maintained and reimagined with bespoke furniture, artwork, and Soho House's signature lighting with hand-blown glass sconces. The vinyl bar hosts member events, listening parties, and lively late nights.

Other events include special film screenings, such as Sofia Coppola's 2023 *Priscilla* biopic, hosted by Bimba Y Lola in collaboration with streaming platform, Mubi.

1 Bonbon

Every Thursday, Leonor becomes Bonbon, where it hosts lively nights of dancing. The music changes according to the DJ, with set lists including everything from Madonna to the hottest beats of the moment. @bonboncondesa

2 Tokyo Music Bar

This bar combines a vast library of vinyl music, an incredible sound system, and cocktails using the finest whisky and saké. A special place to go out for drinks. @tokyomusicbar

3 Antro Juan

A nightclub that centres on electronic and reggaeton

music, and brings in a wide variety of DJs. You'll find it in the heart of Roma Norte. @antro_juan

4 Caimán

Every night, this bar (opposite) welcomes locals and those from further afield with classic, signature or national *cheve* drinks, plus a wine list that constantly changes. It's ideal for experimenting and pairing with the amazing food on offer. @caiman_bar

5 El Micky

A fun bar, El Micky is the ideal place to go for a dance. There's a mixed crowd and you're guaranteed to have a good time. A great way to end a night out. @elmickybar

NIGHTLIFE

The member picks: where to head outdoors in Mexico City Selected by Ana Jimena Ramírez, founder of Sersana

1 Pico del Águila at Ajusco

I love this hike – it takes you to the highest peak of the volcano Ajusco, located at the south part of Mexico City almost 4,000 metres above the sea. On a clear day, you have the best views of the valley and nearby volcanoes.

2 Los Dinamos at Magdalena Contreras

Los Dinamos is one of the most scenic hikes. Get there early to avoid the crowds and look for different trails starting at the fourth dinamo – from an easy walk to trail running or a more demanding hike.

3 Castillo de Chapultepec

If you have time, try to walk or run from **Soho House Mexico City** through Reforma Avenue until you reach the Lions Gate entrance at Chapultepec Park (opposite). Once you're inside, walk all the way up the hill and you'll reach the castle.

4 Valle del Conejo and La Pila at La Marquesa

Another beautiful forest that's ideal for running or long walks. Here, you'll find the best quesadillas and Caldo de Hongos to end your morning with a good breakfast. It's also an excellent spot for child-friendly activities, such as horse riding, trout fishing, go-karting, and more.

5 Tepoztlán, Morelos

Just outside Mexico City, this is my favourite place to hike. Tepoztlán is located at the nearby state of Morelos, around 50 km away, and it's easily reachable by car or bus. The scenery is different to anything you may have seen before.





Behind the design of Soho House Mexico City

The original architecture of **Soho House Mexico City**

(opposite) is beautiful. Spread out over 25,000 sq ft in the heart of Colonia Juárez, it's housed inside the Baroque opulence of Casa Prim, the former residence of General Juan Prim, who commanded the Spanish expeditionary army in Mexico in the early 19th century.

The House consists of three main buildings: the existing casa and an annexe, which features a tequila bar, and a Pool House with a bar and kitchen all located in a greenhouse-style space. Inside the casa is a main bar, restaurant, club spaces and bedrooms. Our design team worked together to preserve the historic character of the building, adding local influences by using artisans and craftspeople from the city, alongside the usual Soho House signature touches that our members know and love.

Historic details, such as existing parquet flooring, door, window and ceiling trims, fireplaces and frescoes have been retained to honour the European origins of Casa Prim. The team also collaborated with artisans and designers from the area, who used their own special techniques to build fixtures and millwork pieces, all of which help to showcase a museum-level collection of Mexican artworks. 1 Estadio Olímpico Universitario Located in Ciudad Universitaria, this stadium's imposing stone materiality and embankment construction is a fusion of contemporary architecture and cultural roots, consolidating its iconic role in Mexican history and culture.

2 Museo Anahuacalli

This architectural jewel was created by Diego Rivera in collaboration with architect Juan O'Gorman. In 2021, it was expanded by Mauricio Rocha, who combined modernity with the museum's rich history, preserving Rivera's original vision.

3 Tlatelolco

The Nonoalco-Tlatelolco housing complex, designed by architect Mario Pani in the 1960s, blends modern innovation with Tlatelolco's rich pre-Hispanic history. It represents the visionary experiment in social housing globally, as well as the architectural ambition of the era.

4 Mercado Abelardo L. Rodríguez

Founded in 1934, the murals of Diego Rivera and his students, plus the intervention of sculptor Isamu Noguchi, give life to this little-known market (opposite). Don't forget to stop by the Antiguo Colegio de San Ildefonso just a few blocks away, an icon of colonial architecture in Mexico.

5 Capilla de Palmira

This masterpiece, designed by Félix Candela, stands out for its innovative, concrete shell structure. Built in the 1950s near Cuernavaca, it's worth visiting if you have the time to travel a little outside the city.
